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City of Cleveland Provides Coronavirus & Other Important Updates - **Update #277**

The City of Cleveland continues to take numerous precautions across multiple departments and divisions amid increasing cases of coronavirus (COVID-19). Below are some important updates. **Mayor Frank G. Jackson signed an order on Jan. 26 extending the City's Proclamation of Civil Emergency through Feb. 28, 2021.** Mayor Jackson's order was amended to include a Stay At Home Advisory. 138 New Confirmed Coronavirus Cases and Four Fatalities Reported in Cleveland

The Cleveland Department of Public Health (CDPH) has been notified of 138 more confirmed cases of coronavirus and four fatalities in city residents for Jan. 27. This brings the total to 23,293 confirmed cases in the City of Cleveland and 216 fatalities. The new confirmed cases include males and females whose ages range from under 10 years old to their 90s. CDPH is working to identify their close contacts who would require testing or monitoring for COVID-19 symptoms. Additionally, one case was transferred as it was determined they were not a Cleveland resident.

As of January 27, there are 767,576 confirmed cases and 9,737 confirmed fatalities in the State of Ohio. There are more than 25.5 million cases and 426,907 deaths in the U.S.

City of Cleveland Statement Regarding Waste Collection & Recycling Comprehensive Review

In September 2020, the City of Cleveland launched a comprehensive review of the entirety of our waste operations including regular trash collection, recycling, bulk pickup, and various other

special waste stream services. To support this review, we engaged GT Environmental, a leading expert in waste management with more than 26 years of experience in the field, to complete a detailed analysis and provide recommendations on the right waste management approach for Cleveland given various environmental, operational, and financial factors.

This type of analysis is an iterative process, which involves the consultant preparing multiple working drafts that are reviewed throughout the life of the project to ensure potential policy and programmatic recommendation align with the City's priorities and context. As we near completion of this important project, a preliminary copy of GT Environmental's Waste Operations Assessment was leaked to the media.

This version has not been fully reviewed internally to ensure that alignment exists, and we cannot comment on the specifics of the draft until that review is fully completed. While the report contains multiple options for waste management moving forward, no final decisions have been made. We anticipate completing that review – including the development of final recommendations – within the next two weeks, with the final report being made available online by mid-to-late of February.

The City of Cleveland has established a call center that is currently available to answer general questions pertaining to the City's vaccine distribution efforts and assist eligible individuals in scheduling an appointment to receive the vaccine.

As a reminder, only individuals who meet the Ohio Department of Health's criteria are eligible to receive the vaccine at this time. Due to limited supply, it will take time for eligible individuals to receive the vaccine. We ask for your patience. As we receive additional supply, we will be opening

up additional vaccination sites and scheduling appointments for eligible individuals to receive the vaccine.

Construction is scheduled to begin February 8, 2021 and will be completed in February 2022. The proposed improvements include:

- Replace the existing 8" water main with a new 12" water main. Provide full and partial depth pavement repairs where needed and new asphalt resurfacing. Repair, curb, sidewalk, curb ramps and drive aprons as necessary.
- Replace the sewer from Helena Avenue to Remington Avenue.
- Replace three traffic signals with Rapid Flashing Beacons.
- Provide new pavement markings and signage which will include bicycle lanes.

Cleveland Hopkins International Airport Now Offering COVID-19 Testing

A new Covid-19 testing site is now open Cleveland Hopkins International Airport (CLE) that provides travelers, visitors, and airport staff with their results, delivered to their phone, in as little as 15 minutes. TACKL Health specializes in rapid mobilization for large-scale testing in locations nationwide. Guests can receive both polymerase chain reaction (PCR) and rapid antigen

tests. The new testing site is located on the ticketing level, near the information desk, and is open from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. seven days a week.

TACKL Health licensed healthcare professionals administer the tests in four private sanitized rooms. Those wishing to get tested can schedule an appointment in advance by scanning a QR code, going to www.tacklhealth.com/cle. Walk-ins are also welcome. Since the testing site is on the public side of the airport, anyone can walk up to get tested. The cost for the rapid antigen test is \$95, \$135 for the PCR test, or \$175 for both. PCR test results arrive via email or a text message in 24 to 48 hours and rapid antigen test results take 15 minutes.

Public Works and Port Control Hiring Snow Removal Vehicle Operators

The City of Cleveland Department of Public Works is hiring [Snow Removal Vehicle Operators](#). This position is seasonal and will be used only during the snow removal season. Required qualifications include:

- High School Diploma or GED;
- Valid Commercial Drivers' License (CDL) Type B with Air Brake Endorsement; and
- Good driving record.

The City of Cleveland Department of Port Control is also hiring [Snow Removal Vehicle Operators](#). This position is seasonal and will be used only during the snow removal season. Airport and departmental requirements include:

- Must successfully complete a Transportation Security Administration (TSA) 10 year fingerprint-based Criminal History Records Check and employment background check and Security Threat Assessment.
- Must be able to pass a pre-employment physical and drug test; and
- Must successfully complete all applicable regulatory airfield Ground Vehicle Operator and Winter Operations training/assessments and maintain corresponding airfield driving privileges.

City Now Accepting Applications for Cleveland Small Business Grant *Emergency Working Capital Program – Specially Impacted Businesses*

The Emergency Working Capital program is designed to assist businesses whose operations are specifically impacted by COVID and have had to take exceptional measures to maintain operations throughout the pandemic. Businesses may receive a \$10,000 loan for working capital and operations costs and a \$10,000 grant to offset costs of PPE and other safety measures. Applicants must complete the Emergency Capital Working Fund [Loan Application](#) and the one-page [supplemental questionnaire](#). Calls Regarding COVID-19 Complaints

With the passage by Cleveland City Council of an ordinance authorizing penalties for non-compliance with Mayor Jackson's mask mandate, enforcement is now in effect. There are two numbers Clevelanders should call regarding non-compliance:

- **Business complaints:** CDPH hotline at (216) 857-7165

- **Individual or private residence complaints:** Cleveland Police non-emergency line at (216) 621-1234

Cleveland City Council recently approved the mandatory use of masks in public spaces as well as certain penalties for individuals and businesses that do not comply. On July 3, Mayor Jackson signed an amended order mandating the use of masks in public in the City of Cleveland to slow the spread of the highly contagious coronavirus. This includes mandatory use in bars, restaurants, shared office settings, rideshares and other shared spaces.

Citations may be issued with fines for the following:

- Any business or person violating the mask or safe-seating order (which maintains social distancing of at least six feet between patrons) is subject to civil penalties in accordance with Ordinance No. 556-2020, specifically chapters 602 and 236.
- Any business in the City of Cleveland with an employee who becomes ill with the coronavirus is required to immediately disinfect and sanitize the premises. Following a warning, they may be subject to a civil penalty of \$1,000 for the first offense and a civil penalty of \$3,000 for each subsequent violation.
